- Colours and numbers - In French, most adjectives come after a noun. - Colours come after the noun, e.g. a blue bird is <u>un oiseau bleu</u>	Fruit and vegetables <i>an apple</i> une pomme <i>an orange</i> une orange <i>a pear</i> une poire <i>a strawberry</i> une fraise <i>a plum</i> une prune <i>a peach</i> une pêche <i>a tomato</i> une tomate <i>a carrot</i> une carotte <i>a melon</i> un melon <i>a cucumber</i> un concombre		omme - pomme ais - voudrais aît – s'il vous plaît ê - pêche

<u>Reading</u> Sometimes words look the same or very similar in French and English. These words are called 'cognates'.	Asking politely Qu'est ce que tu voudrais? Je voudrais... s'il vous plaît merci de rien <i>What would you like?</i> <i>I would like...</i> <i>please</i> <i>thank you</i> <i>you're welcome</i>		- Listen to a story in French and join in - Recognise different fruit and veg - Give opinions of fruit and veg - Ask politely for an item - Write basic descriptions (the colour of a fruit)	
<u>Nouns</u> - Masculine nouns use 'un' and 'le'. - Feminine nouns use 'une' and 'la'. - When a noun is plural (2 or more) we use les (the) or des (some) OR the number e.g. des bananes OR trois bananes. - We usually add an 's' to the noun when it is plural e.g. deux pommes.	Using colours and numbers REMEMBER! The <u>number goes before the noun</u> and the <u>colour goes after the noun</u> . a banana – une banane three bananas – trois bananes (add an 's' to the noun) a yellow banana – une banane jaune three yellow bananas – trois bananes jaunes		How will I use this learning in the future? - Use a range of adjectives to describe nouns - Take part in a simple role play involving asking politely for something - Use negative opinion je n'aime pas to understand how to form negatives (I don't eat).	
<u>Asking politely</u> When asking for something in French, we say 'please' and 'thank you' to be polite.
